Dear Colleague:

The American School of Guatemala has asked Educators' Collaborative to help manage the search for a General Director (Head of School), to begin July 2009. Tracy Berry-Lazo will serve as interim for the upcoming school year.

Also known as Colegio Americano de Guatemala (CAG), the School is an independent, non-profit, college preparatory K-12 day school of 1,450 students. Located on a 53-acre site in a residential area of Guatemala City, the School offers a rigorous academic program modeled after the best educational practices and methodologies of the U.S. Founded in 1945, the School follows principles of co-educational, bi-cultural (Guatemalan-American), bilingual (Spanish-English) teaching. Respect for religious, political, social and ethnic diversity is fundamental to the School's identity. The School enjoys a close, mutually supportive relationship with the nearby Universidad del Valle de Guatemala.

The School is divided into four sections: Early Childhood K-1 (211 students), Elementary 2-5 (460 students), Middle 6-8 (344 students), and High School 9-12 (435 students). As a college preparatory school, CAG places great emphasis on a strong academic program and boasts one of the best bilingual programs in Central America. Graduates are prepared to enter universities in Guatemala, the United States and abroad. Virtually all graduates pursue a post-secondary degree. About two-thirds of the students are Guatemalan while roughly 15% are from the United States. Many parents of CAG students are the social, political and economic leaders of Guatemala.

The School seeks an academic leader who is an effective team-builder and communicator, proficient in both English and Spanish, with strong interpersonal skills and experience within both the American and the International school systems.
